LIVESTOCK GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Return registration forms for Beef, Market Steers, Swine, Sheep, Poultry, Rabbits, and Dairy Goats by July 15 to: P.O. Box 12, Greenwood, AR 72936.

(REGISTRATION DEADLINES WILL BE ENFORCED).

Late registration will be accepted until August 1 of the current year. A \$10.00 late fee will be charged for all late registrations. All animals must be in place on the show grounds by 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday the week of the fair, and must remain on exhibit until released by superintendent.

By submitting an entry and participating in the Sebastian County Fair exhibitors agree to abide by the rules of competition, and the National Code of Show Ring Ethics as stated in the premium list of this event.

1. All owners of livestock or others having same in charge shall care for, guard, protect and preserve the same, as the
2. Sebastian County Fair Association does not undertake to do so, and shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property of the owners thereof. Neither will the Association be responsible for damage done by animals. The Fair Association will provide a night watchman.
2. Each livestock, poultry, or rabbit exhibitor must furnish their own equipment necessary for feeding and caring for their animals. **No straw**, only shavings please. All livestock released Saturday of the fair at the conclusion of the livestock auction and at the superintendent's discretion.

ANIMALS LEAVING BEFORE THESE TIMES WILL FORFEIT ALL PRIZE MONEY.

3. Out of County exhibitors (residing out of county) can exhibit for ribbons, but not for Premium money.
- 4. All stalls and pens must be cleaned before 9:00 a.m. each day and refuse disposed as superintendent may direct.**
5. Stall and/or exhibit space will be assigned by the livestock committee. Anyone setting up in a stall not assigned to them will be asked to relocate to their assigned stall. All stalls must be cleaned out prior to the livestock committee approval and before premium checks will be handed out and animals released.
6. The judges will be selected with the utmost care, and will be familiar with correct judging practices. Decisions of the judges will be final.
7. Premiums will be paid on the point basis.
8. In the event disease should show, the owner will be requested to remove animals for protection of other animals.
9. The minimum premiums will be paid at 25 cents per point.
10. A purebred animal is defined as an animal of a recognized breed which is eligible for registry in the official herd book of that breed
11. Junior livestock entries who are either under or over sale weight will be allowed to show for premium money, but not allowed to sell in the Junior Livestock Auction.

12. To be eligible to show in the junior livestock departments and participate in the Junior Livestock Auction, a participant must meet the following requirements: Be between the ages of 5 and 19 or the first fall semester following High School Graduation, an active member of a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter in Sebastian County and a student in a Sebastian County School District. Each participant must fill out the junior eligibility form contained in this book. This form must be sent in with your registration. **To be eligible for competition in open or junior classes, whether singularly or in groups, animals must be the bona fide property of the exhibitors, and all animals entered for competition, except where otherwise specified, must be entered in the name of the owner, and must have been owned by the owner not less than sixty days prior to the opening day of the fair.** Registry certificate of ownership must be produced, showing the exhibitor to be the owner. In case of transfer of ownership, the date appearing on the transfer will indicate period of ownership. Animals composing a group must all be owned by the same individual, firm, partnership or recognized association, in which case associations will be considered as owners, unless otherwise stated in this premium list.

13. All junior exhibitors with registered breeding stock must have the breed association registration in their own name. No transfer of papers will be allowed for registered animals.

14. All junior exhibitors will be allowed to enter their animals in the open division provided they meet all entry requirements. No junior exhibitor will be allowed to enter an animal in the open division after the entry deadline. Open classes will not be held unless there is at least one open exhibitor.

15. All poultry must be Pullorum-Typhoid tested before being brought to the fair or will not be allowed on the grounds. There will not be any testing on the grounds. Contact the Fair Office for information on testing date and location.

16. The fair board of any county, district, or state reserves the right to have a blood and urine laboratory analysis made for any animal at their fair. Any exhibitor administering a drug to an animal which would render the carcass unfit for human consumption or any exhibitor of an animal producing an analysis indicating the presence of an unapproved drug that can result in a quantitative or qualitative change in the characteristic of the animal will be required to return all premium money and could be banned from further competition. Their name and lab analysis will be submitted to the USDA & FDA for further investigation and possible prosecution. Any animal receiving medication for any life threatening disease or illness must be registered at the time they are entered in the fair.

17. An entrance fee will be charged at the gate for all persons entering the fairground.

18. There will be a \$10.00 stall fee per animal for livestock (cattle, sheep, goats, and swine) For poultry and rabbits, there will be a \$10 fee for the first 5 entries and an additional \$1.50 for each entry over 5. Must be included with registration.

19. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animals to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and Provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with Federal, State, and Provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question, and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely Responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

20. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

21. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, administering by hose are not acceptable and are prohibited.

22. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

23. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

24. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

25. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this code of show ring ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.

26. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

27. Exhibitor must attend 1 work day, with a superintendent on day of their choice. Work days will be announced to each participant prior to and after the fair. 1 work day must be completed prior to fair and 1 cleanup day after the fair to receive a premium check.

28. Exhibitors must wear 4-H or FFA attire while showing and at auction.

EVERY EXHIBITOR MUST COME TO THE GENERAL REGISTRATION TABLE LOCATED IN THE FAIR OFFICE BUILDING TO REGISTER AND GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER BY 5:30PM. TUESDAY OF THE FAIR. IF YOU DO NOT GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER, YOUR ENTRY WILL BE INELIGIBLE FOR JUDGING. ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED. Shavings will be available the Monday prior to the show and it is up to the exhibitor to get them in their stalls. Cattle must be in place by 5:30pm Tuesday. All stalls regardless of species must be clean prior to leaving on Saturday. Health papers, 840, and registration papers as needed when checking in.

EXHIBITION LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION AND ENTRY PERMITS: "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" refers to a legible record (made on an official form issued from the state of origin) by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet health requirements of the state of destination. It must bear the identification of each animal and separate certificates must be made for each species of animal entered. Entry permits are required on all out-of-state swine, rodeo bulls, unless they are tested within thirty (30) days of entry, psittacines, passerines, ratites, all other avian species except poultry and turkeys, cervids, camelids, or exotic animals.
2. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested.
3. All heifers 4-12 months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.
4. Heifers over 12 months of age will not be allowed to show unless originating from a Brucellosis Certified Free Herd.
5. All sexually intact dairy cattle 6 months of age and older will be required to have a negative tuberculosis (TB) test and a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, unless originating from an accredited free TB herd.
6. All breeding beef cattle 12 months of age and older entering Arkansas must originate from a TB-free state or TB-free herd, or have a negative test within 30 days of shipment in addition to a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

ARKANSAS SWINE

1. As of July 1, 2002, all swine must have an official premise identification.
2. Animals 6 months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within 90 days of exhibition or originate directly out of a Validated Herd, with Validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested).
3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies regardless of age within 90 days of the exhibition on a test approved by the state veterinarian or originated directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd, with Qualified Herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.
4. Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

ARKANSAS SHEEP

All sheep must be identified by a 840 EID tag and an official USDA Scrapie tag. Sheep will be inspected on grounds. Sheep showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, and sheep pox will not be allowed to show.

ARKANSAS GOATS

All goats must be identified by a 840 EID tag and an official USDA Scrapie tag, legible official goat registry tattoo if accompanied by a registration certificate, or device that contains a premise identification. Goats will be inspected on ground. Goats showing evidence of abscesses or any other disease will not be allowed to show.

ARKANSAS RABBITS

Rabbits will be inspected on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show.

ARKANSAS POULTRY

An official representing the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition, giving names, place, inclusive dates, and time of the event. The requirements are as follows:

1. All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present at exhibition in Arkansas shall have originated from U. S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited). This information will be documented on a NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90 Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate which will accompany the poultry during exhibition.
2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wrap-around plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.
3. Any poultry showing evidence of infectious or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.
4. Record Keeping - The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry present at exhibition. This list shall contain the name and address of each owner, quantity, species, breed, variety, type, sex, and pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months.
5. Other in-state Tame or Exotic Animals - please call state veterinarian's office for information and permit.

Permit numbers can be obtained from the state veterinarians office (501) 907-2400 from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all out-of-state animals and:

- (a) Must be available on request by animal health officials.
- (b) Individually identify all animals, showing positive identification of each animal by tattoo, ear tag, registration number or ear notch. Steers should be identified by description.
- (c) Show required tests, vaccinations, and entry permit number, if applicable.
- (d) Show name and address of owner or exhibitor - this shall be the same name as under which animals are exhibited.

2. Any animal or poultry showing any evidence of infectious or contagious disease, or of external parasitism, and animals with active ringworm lesions (with the resulting loss of hair), multiple warts easily visible without close examination, or atrophic rhinitis, will not be permitted to exhibit.
3. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet requirements of their particular species.
4. All animals originating out of areas quarantined because of other disease (vesicular stomatitis, scabies, etc.) will not be permitted to enter the state.

**ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK
COUNTY, JR. DISTRICT, DISTRICT,
STATE FAIR LEVEL, AND OTHER SHOWS**

1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.
2. Arkansas livestock must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 90 days prior to exhibition.

ARKANSAS CATTLE

1. If Arkansas is not a Class Free State then the following testing requirements must be met: Negative brucellosis test within ninety (30) days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and over. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd are exempt if the Certified Free Herd number is shown on certificate. Any heifer over 4 months must be calfhood vaccinated.

REGULATIONS

Entries close **July 15th**. Entries must be mailed to: PO Box 12, Greenwood, Ar. 72936, or postmarked by post office by this date. All entries must be accompanied by entry fees.

Late entries in the LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT, if accepted, will be charged double the amount of the entry fee. Class substitution on existing entries may be made at a cost of 1/2 plus the regular entry fee. **ABSOLUTELY** no entry will be accepted after **August 1st**. This must be handled at the MAIN OFFICE—prior to check-in of animals.

NO REFUND WILL BE MADE AFTER ENTRIES CLOSE. A \$25.00 charge will be assessed for checks returned from the bank for any reason.

EXHIBITOR ENTRY STATEMENT

See Exhibitors General rules and regulations on **Page 17-22**.

Exhibitor Entry Statement (back of entry form) must be signed and returned to the Sebastian county fair office WITH the exhibitor Entry Form. If the statement is not signed or returned with the entry form the exhibitors entry will be returned.

Entries in this division open only to exhibitors who comply with the Rule No. 40. All animals must be unregistered crossbreeds and not subject to registered. Tattoos that can be traced to a breed association will result in animal being disqualified.

All entries are subject to rules applicable to the JUNIOR DEPARTMENT GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS as set forth in the catalog.

Participation is limited to students only who are BONA FIDE members of a FFA or 4-H Club in good Standing Animals must be entered on official JUNIOR entry form.

THE COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT OR VOCATIONAL INSTRUCTOR MUST SIGN AND FORWARD TO THE SEBASTIAN COUNTY FAIR BY JULY 15TH IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE.

ANY ANIMAL THAT IS SHOWN IN THE SEBASTIAN COUNTY FAIR AND HAS NOT HAD THEIR HEALTH PAPERS CHECKED BY ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY PERSONNEL UPON ARRIVAL AT THE FAIRGROUNDS WILL BE DISQUALIFIED FROM COMPETITION, AND NO PREMIUMS OR PRIZES WILL BE AWARDED.

1. All exhibitors that make the SCF auction must be an active and bona fide member of a Sebastian County FFA Chapter or 4-H Club.

2. Animals for the SCF Junior Livestock Auction will be the following:

The **Top 10 Market** animals eligible for auction will be the following: barrow, wether sheep, wether goat, steer, pullet chain, single fryer rabbit, and meat pen rabbit. The

Top 5 of Breeding animals eligible for auction will be the following: beef cattle, Bull, gilt, Ewe, Doe, Dairy Cattle, and Dairy Goat will be eligible for auction. Supreme and Reserve Supreme of the following will be eligible for auction: Rabbit & Poultry

3. All animals entered at the SCF must be entered no later than July 15 the current year.

4. Exhibitors must be present at the time of sale, if an exhibitor has a legitimate excuse-sickness, school/church functions, exhibitor's needs to get with the director and discuss an alternate exhibitors to help.

5. All market, registered, and commercial Grand and Reserve Champions will be eligible for auction. With the inclusion of registered and commercial animals eligible for auction they will only be able to be in auction 1 time. Registered and Commercial animals can be shown multiple years for ribbons and premiums but said Registered and Commercial animals may only make auction once.

6. Animals being sold will be ranked by judge and have meet the weight requirements to be eligible for auction. If exhibitor does not make auction due to rankings or weight requirements the exhibitor will still be added to the add on sheets that are provided during auction.

7. Exhibitors who qualify for the auction with more than one animal and or have grand/reserve in multiple species must report to livestock office by Friday at 9am and let the director know which animal you would like in auction. Failure to do this will results in forfeit their auction slot.

8. All livestock sold to a buyer that is going to processor is the responsibly of the buyer and exhibitor to arrange transport to desired processor. The Sebastian County Fair is not responsible to provide transport.

9. Exhibitors MUST have and provide a social security number to be in the sale. W-9 forms will be filled out during the exhibitors meeting on Friday, August 28 th @ 6pm. If this form is not filled out you will not be able to participate in the junior livestock auction. All exhibitors that make \$2,000.00 or more will receive a W-9 form.

10. Exhibitors that are eligible for auction must attend the auction meeting on Friday, August 28 th @ 6pm at the barn. At this time that is when the exhibitors will fill out a Sebastian County Fair Junior Livestock Auction & Exhibitor Contract. If exhibitor is not able to attend this meeting they must get with the livestock director and let them know.

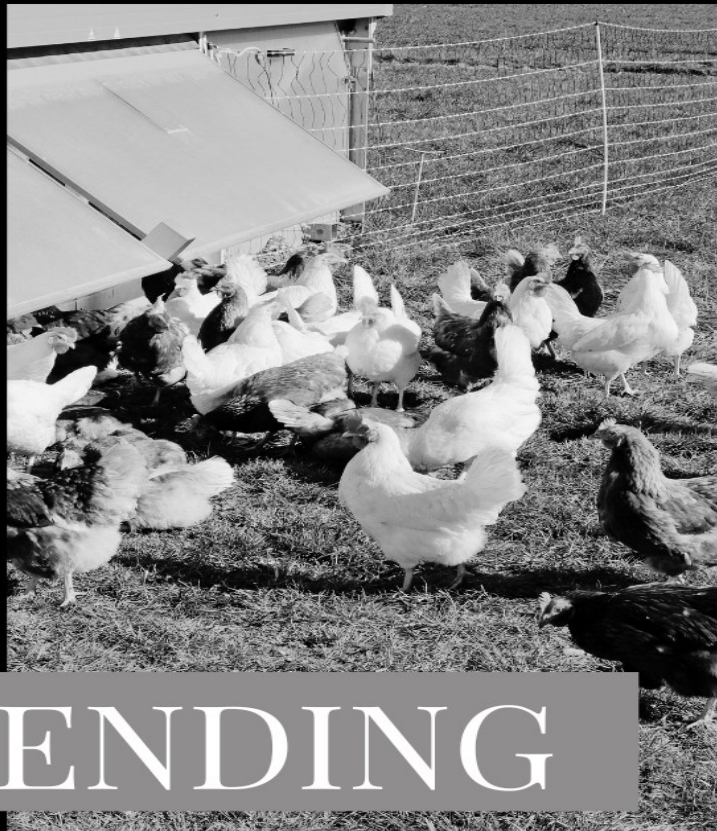

11. Exhibitors that make auction must write a thank you card for the main buyer of their project, along with making a thank you basket for that buyer. The Sebastian County Fair Association will not be providing auction gifts. That will be the exhibitor's responsibility. Thank you cards will provided by the Sebastian County Fair Association and be available at the livestock office.

12. All exhibitors must send thank you cards to all buyers and add on donors prior to picking up check. These notes/cards must be filled out, addressed, and stamped before receiving checks. Livestock Director will have a list for all exhibitors that has information for each buyer/add on donor. This list will be either emailed, or picked up at a designated time. After picking up list the exhibitors will have 2-3 weeks to get the thank you cards filled out, addressed, and stamped. The Livestock Director will set up dates to pick up checks- at that time the exhibitor will bring thank you cards to hand to director to check off. Exhibitor will receive check after all these task are done. This information will be in the contract that exhibitors have to sign before auction.

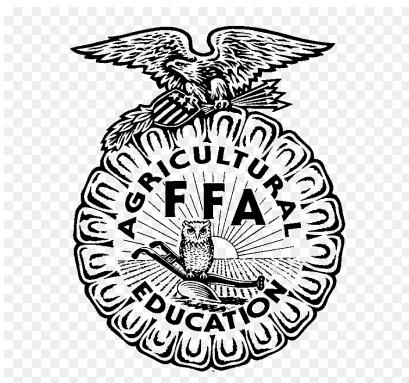

Meat class will be judged as specified in the ARBA Standard of Perfection and is limited to junior exhibitors. All Meat Class rabbits must be weighed by the Judge or in the Judge's presence at the time of judging.

1. A meat pen is one pen consisting of three rabbits of the same breed and variety, under 10 weeks of age; minimum 3 1/2 pounds, not over 5 1/2 pounds each.
2. A Single Fryer is one rabbit, under 10 weeks of age; minimum 3 1/2 pounds, not over 5 1/2 pounds. Single Fryers cannot be a part of a meat pen trio.

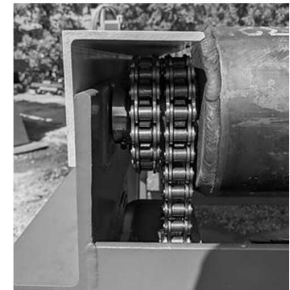

Entry Fee \$10 per exhibitor per project

Division 27

General Rules:

Nominations: There will be no nominations for the Ag Mechanics Competition.

Eligibility: Entries in this show are limited to Sebastian County 4-H and FFA members. The projects must have been constructed by 4-H and FFA members.

A project may only be exhibited one (1) time at the Sebastian County Fair and only in one division.

Any project that does not fit into one (1) of the stated classes will be deemed ineligible and disqualified by Show officials.

Projects may have been constructed by an individual or a group and may be individually or chapter-owned. All projects must be entered in the names of the exhibitors who participated in the planning and construction of the project.

Each exhibitor may enter six (6) individual projects; no more than one (1) per division. Each group of students may enter six (6) group projects; no more than one (1) entry per division.

A group of exhibitors shall not exceed four (4) students showing the project for a team.

Substitutions of projects may happen until the contest check in concludes

Exhibitors should be dressed appropriately and remain with their project during judging, official FFA or 4-H show attire is required, see general rules.

Loss or Damage: Every precaution will be taken to protect the projects entered; however, neither the Sebastian County Fair, it's staff, directors, superintendents nor judges will be responsible for any loss or damage to projects.

Entries: The entry fee is \$10.

Showmanship

Exhibitors should be courteous and helpful to those viewing their project, including those exhibiting next to them. Exhibitors should not interfere with or shield those who are exhibiting next to them.

Exhibitors should be prepared to answer questions when their project is being judged. Knowledge of the project will be evaluated at that time. Exhibitors should be well informed on the project they are representing, but should not be boisterous or argumentative.

Exhibitors should make available any equipment that may be necessary to evaluate their project (flashlights, mat or creeper, square, tape, multi-meter, etc.). Exhibitors may be requested to hold measuring tape and assist the judge in making measurements on projects.

Teams should indicate to the judges which team member served as lead engineer and welder to better present information to the judges. All team members may present, but it is the responsibility of the team to clarify which team members worked on specific areas of the project.

All projects should be complete including finish. Any item, necessary for use of the project, must be a part of it (example: hinges and latches on gates and panels, lift pins, hydraulic hoses on tractor equipment, etc.), including documentation.

All projects must be painted or properly treated and must be clean and in a presentable condition, even though they may have been used. No touch up painting of ANY type will be allowed inside the exhibit area.

No electricity will be available for computers or other electronic devices. An effort will be made to provide electricity for projects requiring it for operation during judging only

Documentation of Project:

Portfolio: The original (exhibitor drawn) plan or drawing, a bill of materials and photographs showing all phases of construction/restoration should be bound together via binder or folder. You may include an additional cover page but not required, and should also include a marketing flyer. Exhibitors may use their discretion on this part of the documentation but all of the above must be included. Use the checklist below

1A: Exhibitor Drawn

Plan

1B: Bill of Materials

1C: Up to 20 photographs of project construction

1D: Marketing Flyer (Details Below): Each team will develop an 8.5" by 11" one-sided flyer promoting and detailing the product. The flyer should be designed to be utilized as an advertisement and an overview of the product to be shared with customers. Please attach the hard copy to the back of the documentation portfolio

Safety on the Fairgrounds:

General Safety – Appropriate and safe display stands must be provided for gates, panels and other projects that need support. Sharp edges and points, such as found on self-feeder roofs, bale movers, etc. are to be padded or covered as necessary to prevent injury. Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be used, stored or sprayed inside any building at any time. This shall include, but not limited to, enamel paints, thinners, reducers, gasoline or any other petroleum-based liquids. All liquids must be in properly labeled original containers. All compressed gas cylinders shall be properly secured. Hand wheels are to be removed. Protective caps installed and taped. No regulators or hoses are to be installed at any time.

Trailer Safety – All trailers and other equipment to be operated and/or transported on public roads are to be equipped with safety equipment specified in Arkansas Statutes. All towed equipment, regardless of standards, is to be equipped with safety chains. All three-point hitch and power take off (PTO) operated equipment are to meet current ASABE Safety and dimension standards.

Electrical Safety – All 120 VAC and higher electrical plugs and receptacles must be grounded. Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCI) shall be required for all 120 VAC receptacles. All electrical connections are to be protected in appropriate indoor or outdoor rated enclosures.

Projects with Engines – There is to be no more than five (5) gallons of fuel in any fuel tank. Fuel cap taped closed and secure against tampering. Disconnect all batteries. No vehicle and/or equipment refueling inside any building.

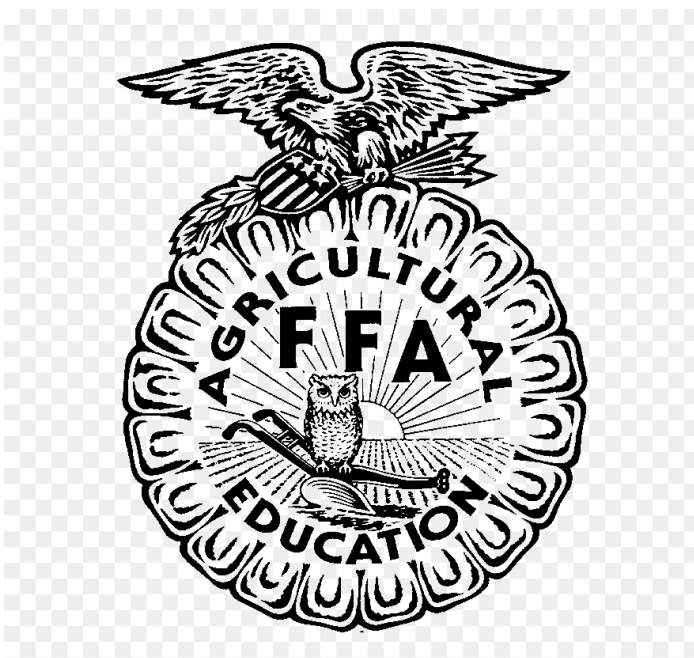

Any exhibitor residing out of Sebastian County will exhibit for show only. **No premiums will be paid to out of county exhibitors.**
2. **ENTRIES MAY ONLY BE MADE THE SATURDAY BEFORE THE FAIR BETWEEN 10:00 AM AND 2:00 PM OR MONDAY OF THE FAIR BETWEEN 1:00 PM and 7:00 PM. FOOD PRESERVATION ENTRIES SHOULD BE MADE ON MONDAY.** Cut flowers entered on Monday in the Floral Design and Floriculture departments may be replaced with fresher blossoms between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m. on Tuesday of the fair.
3. Exhibits can be made in the name of the maker only. Whenever the superintendent receives the information or has doubt that the exhibit is made by the exhibitor, an affidavit will be required to remove the question of doubt. If it is ascertained that any exhibitor has made a false statement or entry in regard to any article exhibited, all premiums awarded shall be forfeited.
4. Soiled articles will not be accepted. All imported articles are strictly prohibited.
5. Each entry must have been completed during the past year. No exhibit shall be entered in the Sebastian County Fair a second time.
6. **EXHIBITORS ARE LIMITED TO ONLY ONE ENTRY IN A CLASS.**
7. All persons exhibiting must be at the grounds personally, or have a representative check their exhibits in & check them out. Exhibits must be placed by 7p.m. Monday of the fair, & must remain on exhibit until 1p.m. Monday following the fair.
8. **IF AN EXHIBITOR REMOVES HIS/HER EXHIBIT BEFORE 1:00 P.M. MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR, ALL PREMIUMS AWARDED SHALL BE FORFEITED.**
9. **EXHIBITS MAY BE REMOVED AT 3:00 P.M. the Monday following the fair. ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE REMOVED BY 7:00 P.M. MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR, AT WHICH TIME THE BUILDING WILL BE LOCKED. THE FAIR WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR EXHIBITS NOT CLAIMED BY 7:00 P.M MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR.**
10. At the beginning of each department is a proposed criteria for judging items in that department. This criteria will be used as a guideline to award a blue, red, or white ribbon to each item.
11. Worthy exhibits will be rated A, B, or C. Premiums will be paid on the point basis, at the rate of 25 cents per point. Judging of Creative Arts exhibits will be Tuesday of the fair at 10 a.m.
12. All exhibits are judged on their own merit. They are not judged in competition with other entries in the class.
13. Every exhibit will be under the control of the superintendent, and every possible care will be taken to prevent damage; but in no case will the Fair be responsible for damage or loss that may occur.
14. Entries will be accepted only for the classes listed in each department.
15. Canned products may be shown in standard jars only, not larger than quarts. Jelly may be shown in standard jelly glasses which have been sealed. Paraffin is not allowed. Please follow rules listed on pages 70—71 of this book.

16. Division Requirements: Adult department is open to anyone ages 20 and over or married individuals under 20, Youth department is open to unmarried youth ages 5 through 19, Clothesline Art is open to anyone ages 2 and up (See Department 21 for more details).
17. Items should have no visible identifying marks. Identifying marks should be removed or completely covered. If any identifying marks are visible at the time of judging it will result in an automatic 3rd place.
18. Superintendents have the right to refuse any item that is inappropriate or not in the best interest of the fair.

EVERY EXHIBITOR MUST COME TO THE GENERAL REGISTRATION TABLE, LOCATED IN THE CREATIVE ARTS BUILDING, TO REGISTER AND TO GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER. IF YOU DO NOT GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER YOUR ENTRY WILL BE INELIGIBLE FOR JUDGING. THE FAIR ASSOCIATION WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR EXHIBITS NOT PICKED UP BY MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR BY 7:00 PM. UNCLAIMED EXHIBITS WILL REMAIN IN THE CREATIVE ARTS BUILDING AND WILL BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE FAIR ASSOCIATION AND DISPOSED OF AS SEEN FIT BY FAIR OFFICIALS. FAILURE TO PICK UP EXHIBIT ITEMS WILL RE-

Preservation Rules

1. All entries must have been preserved within the previous twelve months and can only be entered once.
2. NOTE: Exhibits must be labeled with the date of food preservation and method of preservation. Method must state whether canned in water, pressure canned, or other, process time and the pounds of pressure where appropriate. Entries without required labeling will not be judged This will save time with getting items checked in.
3. Judging will be done by comparison to recognized standards of quality and safety.
4. For judging and safety reasons, jars must be clear glass with Mason type labeled on jar or box with clean metal lid and ring, vacuum sealed and of acceptable size per recipe. Typically quart, pint, or smaller
5. Due to safety reasons no canned squash including summer, zucchini or spaghetti, pureed or mashed pumpkin, sweet potatoes, or potatoes will be judged. Pickled summer squash and zucchini are allowed.
6. If recipe used is not from either : So Easy to Preserve, 4th, 5th, and 6th Editions, Univeristy of Georgia Cooperative Extension Service
USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning, 2009 revision. USDA and National Institute of Food and Agriculture.
Then entry should be also accompanied by recipe from other Extension publications upbdated or published after 1995. Each entry should have a tag attached to the jar with date canned, method used, and a recipe.
7. Headspace is the unfilled space above the food in a jar and below the lid.
Recommedations for headspace are:
1/4 inch for jams, jellies, juices, and fruit purees
1/2 inch for fruits, pickles, and tomatoes processed in a water-bath canner
1 to 1 1/4 inches for vegetables, meats, or other products processed in a pressure canner.
8. Food should be packed into the jar in such a way that heat can easily penetrate throughout the jar's contents. This means there must be proper balance of solids and liquids. Tightly packed solids make it difficult for heat to penetrate throughout the mass.
9. There should be enough liquid present so that liquid covers the product and prevents the jar from being solid, yet there should not be excess liquid.

Preservation Rules Continued:

10. Although sealing jelly with paraffin was once a standard practice, this is no longer recommended, and will NOT be allowed to enter in the fair.

11. Containers:

Products should be in a Mason-type, standard size (1/2 pint, pint, or quart), clear canning jar. Regular or wide-mouth styles may be used, but containers must have a threaded top with a self-sealing, two-piece metal lid.

Commercial jars, like the ones used for mayonnaise, peanut butter, jelly, etc are not recommended for home canning. Since they are much more likely to break during processing and are less likely to seal properly, they are NOT allowed for competition in fairs. If jars of this type are entered, they will not be judged.

Also, if jars were purchased in the canning section of a store but do not specify that they are Mason-type jars either on the jar itself or on the box, they are not allowed for competition. They may be safe for home canning, but no current USDA recommendations exist for their use. Colored jars are also excluded.

Two-piece lids consist of a flat metal lid held in place by a metal band. Lids must be brand new. Bands should be clean and free of rust. They should not be bent or misshapen. The old style bail-type closures and porcelain-lined zinc caps are not acceptable. Plastic lids may be safe for home canning, but are NOT allowed for competition, as it is impossible to detect a correct seal.

Jars should be clean and free of mineral deposits. The jars will be tested to see that the jar has a seal. This is usually done by pressing the middle of the lid with a finger. If the lid springs up when the finger is removed, the lid is not sealed. An alternative test would be to hold the jar at eye level and look across the lid. A sealed lid should appear curved down in the center, not flat or bulging.

Technique: Blocks may be hand or machine pieced. Appliqué blocks may be sewn by machine or hand. You may use fusible web or interfacing. Embellishments such as hand embroidery, ribbons, buttons, and decorative machine stitches are welcome. You can use fabric paint, fabric markers, or fabric crayons to create your block. Three dimensional work or padded is not permitted. Design cannot be made on point, keep block square. Do not quilt your entry. Theme is America the Beautiful.

Eligibility: Open to all ages and skill levels. Participants may enter more than one block.

To Enter: Please bring your entries to check in to the fairgrounds August 22nd or 24th. Please pin a piece of paper to the back of your block with your name, address and phone. Blocks become property of the Fair and will be made into a quilt to be displayed and raffled off at the next Sebastian County Fair. Hay Show

This year's hay show will be held in combination with the Sebastian County Fair. The Hay show is open to all Sebastian County hay producers at a minimal cost of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per sample. The Purpose of the hay show is to encourage producers to test his/her hay to determine the nutritional content of the product they produce. All Sebastian County producers are encouraged to participate.

Rules and Regulations

1. Each class entry shall contain a representative sample of hay produced in Sebastian County by the contestant.
2. Hay samples are due no later than 4:30 p.m. August 10th, at the Sebastian County Extension Service 7600 Taylor Ave. Barling, Arkansas.
3. Samples can be submitted by contacting the Extension Office at 479-484-7737 or by delivering a core sample and visual sample of your hay to the Extension Office by the entry deadline.
4. Only core samples taken with an approved forage/hay probe will be accepted for chemical analysis in the Sebastian County Hay Show. Hay Probes are available to be checked out at the extension office if the producer does not have access to one. Producers are **encouraged** to contact the extension agent to visit their farm or field and collect samples for hay show entry.
5. Current Year Sebastian County Hay samples should include: 1) approximately one-half pound core sample hay **and** 2) a 1 gallon freezer bag full of loose hay to be used as a visual representation of analyzed hay.
6. No grab or loose samples will be accepted for analysis in the Sebastian County Hay show. Grab or loose samples will only be utilized as a visual sample to be viewed at hay show.
7. Entries will be displayed at the Sebastian County Fair; samples will be displayed using an assigned number to be provided by hay show coordinator. No names or other identification will be displayed on the representative sample. Hay show samples will be separate from hay samples entered in the agronomy division (which receive no analysis and are only awarded premium points).
8. An educational meeting will immediately follow the meal.
9. Samples will be ranked using visual examination (Totaling 50 points) and laboratory analysis using the Relative Feed Value score (Totaling 50 points)
10. Entry Fee is the cost of each sample.
11. Awards will be given as follows: Sebastian County Best of Show, Bermudagrass – Common Division Winner, Bermudagrass – Hybrid Division winner, Mixed Grass Division winner, and Other Division winner. Awards will also be given to producers with the highest % CP and highest % TDN.
12. All exhibits will be destroyed at the conclusion of the Sebastian County Fair.
