

## SEBASTIAN COUNTY FAIR MISSION STATEMENT

The Sebastian County Fair Association exists exclusively for the purpose of instructing and educating the residents of Sebastian County in the areas of creative arts and agriculture by conducting, but not limited to, public fairs and exhibits. The Sebastian County Fair is one of the events sponsored by the Association for this purpose and is recognized by the State of Arkansas as the official county fair for Sebastian County. This accomplishment cannot be made without the involvement of volunteers and the dedication of Association members whose mission is to influence the youth of Sebastian County in the areas of creative arts and agriculture, therefore creating community development. The Sebastian County Fair Association pledges its support in providing premium money, prizes, and scholarships to the youth for this purpose. These funds shall be raised through state and county contributions, public donations, and facility generated profits. It is the aim and goal of the Association to return all funds to the mission of the Sebastian County Fair Association.

#### SEBASTIAN COUNTY FAIR GREENWOOD, ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

(REGISTRATION DEADLINES WILL BE ENFORCED).

Late registration will be accepted until August 1 of the current year. A \$10.00 late fee will be charged for all late registrations. All animals must be in place on the show grounds by 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday the week of the fair, and must remain on exhibit until released bu superintendant.

By submitting an entry and participating in the Sebastian County Fair exhibitors agree to abide by the rules of competition, and the National Code of Show Ring Ethics as stated in the premium list of this event.

- 1. All owners of livestock or others having same in charge shall care for, guard, protect and preserve the same, as the Sebastian County Fair Association does not undertake to do so, and shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property of the owners thereof. Neither will the Association be responsible for damage done by animals. The Fair Association will provide a night watchman.
- 2. Each livestock, poultry, or rabbit exhibitor must furnish their own equipment necessary for feeding and caring for their animals. **No straw,** only shavings please. All livestock released Saturday of the fair at the conclusion of the livestock auction and at the superintendent's discretion.

#### ANIMALS LEAVING BEFORE THESE TIMES WILL FORFEIT ALL PRIZE MONEY.

- 3. Out of County exhibitors (residing out of county) can exhibit for ribbons, but not for Premium money.
- 4. All stalls and pens must be cleaned before 9:00 a.m. each day and refuse disposed as superintendent may direct.
- 5. Stall and/or exhibit space will be assigned by the superintendent of the department of entry. All stalls must be cleaned out to the department committee approval before premium checks will be handed out and animals released.
- 6. The judges will be selected with the utmost care, and will be familiar with correct judging practices. Decisions of the judges will be final.
- 7. Premiums will be paid on the point basis.
- In the event disease should show, the owner will be requested to remove animals for protection of other animals.
- 9. The minimum premiums will be paid at 25 cents per point.
- 10. A purebred animal is defined as an animal of a recognized breed which is eligible for registry in the official herd book of that breed.
- 11. Junior livestock entries who are either under or over sale weight will be allowed to show for premium money, but not allowed to sell in the Junior Livestock Auction.

- 12. To be eligible to show in the junior livestock departments and participate in the Junior Livestock Auction, a participant must meet the following requirements: Be between the ages of 9 and 19 or the first fall semester following High School Graduation, an active member of a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter in Sebastian County and a student in a Sebastian County School District. Each participant must fill out the junior eligibility form contained in this book. This form must be sent in with your registration.
- 13. All junior exhibitors with registered breeding stock must have the breed association registration in their own name. No transfer of papers will be allowed for registered animals.
- 14. All junior exhibitors will be allowed to enter their animals in the open division provided they meet all entry requirements. No junior exhibitor will be allowed to enter an animal in the open division after the entry deadline. Open classes will not be held unless there is at least one open exhibitor.
- 15. All poultry must be Pullorum-Typhoid tested before being brought to the fair or will not be allowed on the grounds. There will not be any testing on the grounds. Contact the Extension Office for information on testing date and location.
- 16. The fair board of any county, district, or state reserves the right to have a blood and urine laboratory analysis made for any animal at their fair. Any exhibitor administering a drug to an animal which would render the carcass unfit for human consumption or any exhibitor of an animal producing an analysis indicating the presence of an unapproved drug that can result in a quantitative or qualitative change in the characteristic of the animal will be required to return all premium money and could be banned from further competition. Their name and lab analysis will be submitted to the USDA & FDA for further investigation and possible prosecution. Any animal receiving medication for any life threatening disease or illness must be registered at the time they are entered in the fair.
- 17. An entrance fee will be charged at the gate for all persons entering the fairground.
- 18. There will be a \$5.00 stall fee per animal for livestock (cattle, sheep, goats, and swine) For poultry and rabbits, there will be a \$5 fee for the first 5 entries and an additional \$1.50 for each entry over 5. Must be included with registration.
- 19. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animals to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and Provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with Federal, State, and Provincial statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question, and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely

Responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 20. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 21. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, administering by hose are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 22. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibit tors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 23. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 24. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 25. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this code of show ring ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.
- 26. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.
- 27. Commercial Animals— If a female is shown in the market show and wins Grand or Reserve Champion with that female you will **NOT** be eligible to compete in the commercial Show. Includes cattle, and swine.
- 28. Exhibitor must attend 1 work day, August 10th 5pm—8pm or Saturday August 12th 8am—12pm or with a superintendent on day of their choice.

EVERY EXHIBITOR MUST COME TO THE GENERAL REGISTRATION TABLE LOCATED IN THE FAIR OFFICE BUILDING TO REGISTER AND GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER BY 8:00 PM, TUESDAY OF THE FAIR. IF YOU DO NOT GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER, YOUR ENTRY WILL BE INELIGIBLE FOR JUDGING.ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED

## EXHIBITION LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- 1. CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION AND ENTRY PERMITS: "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" refers to a legible record (made on an official form issued from the state of origin) by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet health requirements of the state of destination. It must bear the identification of each animal and separate certificates must be made for each species of animal entered. Entry permits are required on all out-of-state swine, rodeo bulls, unless they are tested within thirty (30) days of entry, psittacines, passerines, ratites, all other avian species except poultry and turkeys, cervids, camelids, or exotic animals.
- 2. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested.
- 3. All heifers 4-12 months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.
- 4. Heifers over 12 months of age will not be allowed to show unless originating from a Brucellosis Certified Free Herd.
- 5. All sexually intact dairy cattle 6 months of age and older will be required to have a negative tuberculosis (TB) test and a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, unless originating from an accredited free TB herd.
- 6. All breeding beef cattle 12 months of age and older entering Arkansas must originate from a TB-free state or TB-free herd, or have a negative test within 30 days of shipment in addition to a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

#### **ARKANSAS SWINE**

- 1. As of July 1, 2002, all swine must have an official premise identification.
- 2. Animals 6 months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within 90 days of exhibition or originate directly out of a Validated Herd, with Validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested).
- 3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies regardless of age within 90 days of the exhibition on a test approved by the state veterinarian or originated directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd, with Qualified Herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.
- 4. Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

#### **ARKANSAS SHEEP**

All sheep must be identified by an official USDA Scrapie tag. Sheep will be inspected on grounds. Sheep showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, and sheep pox will not be allowed to show.

#### **ARKANSAS GOATS**

All goats must be identified by an official USDA Scrapie tag, legible official goat registry tattoo if accompanied by a registration certificate, or device that contains a premise identification. Goats will be inspected on ground. Goats showing evidence of abscesses or any other disease will not be allowed to show.

#### **ARKANSAS RABBITS**

Rabbits will be inspected on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show.

#### **ARKANSAS POULTRY**

An official representing the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition, giving names, place, inclusive dates, and time of the event. The requirements are as follows:

- 1. All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present at exhibition in Arkansas shall have originated from U. S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited). This information will be documented on a NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90 Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate which will accompany the poultry during exhibition.
- 2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wrap-around plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.
- 3. Any poultry showing evidence of infectious or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.
- 4. Record Keeping The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry present at exhibition. This list shall contain the name and address of each owner, quantity, species, breed, variety, type, sex, and pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months.
- 5. Other in-state Tame or Exotic Animals please call state veterinarian's office for information and permit.



Permit numbers can be obtained from the state veterinarians office (501) 907-2400 from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all out-of-state animals and:


- (a) Must be available on request by animal health officials.
- (b) Individually identify all animals, showing positive identification of each animal by tattoo, ear tag, registration number or ear notch. Steers should be identified by description.
- (c) Show required tests, vaccinations, and entry permit number, if applicable.
- (d) Show name and address of owner or exhibitor this shall be the same name as under which animals are exhibited.
- 2. Any animal or poultry showing any evidence of infectious or contagious disease, or of external parasitism, and animals with active ringworm lesions (with the resulting loss of hair), multiple warts easily visible without close examination, or atrophic rhinitis, will not be permitted to exhibit.
- 3. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet requirements of their particular species.
- 4. All animals originating out of areas quarantined because of other disease (vesicular stomatitis, scabies, etc.) will not be permitted to enter the state.

#### ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK COUNTY, JR. DISTRICT, DISTRICT, STATE FAIR LEVEL, AND OTHER SHOWS

- 1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.
- **2.** Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses, steers and rabbits) must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 90 days prior to exhibition, showing the following:

#### **ARKANSAS CATTLE**

1. If Arkansas is not a Class Free State then the following testing requirements must be met: Negative brucellosis test within ninety (30) days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and over. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd are exempt if the Certified Free Herd number is shown on certificate. Any heifer over 4 months must be calfhood vaccinated.



#### REGULATIONS

Entries close **July 15th**. Entries must be mailed to: PO Box 12, Greenwood, Ar. 72936, or postmarked by post office by this date. All entries must be accompanied by entry fees.

Late entries in the LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT, if accepted, will be charged double the amount of the entry fee. Class substitution on existing entries may be made at a cost of 1/2 plus the regular entry fee. **ABSO-LUTELY** no entry will be accepted after **August 1st.** This must be handled at the MAIN OFFICE—prior to check-in of animals.

NO REFUND WILL BE MADE AFTER ENTRIES CLOSE. A \$25.00 charge will be assessed for checks returned from the bank for any reason.

#### **EXHIBITOR ENTRY STATEMENT**

See Exhibitors General rules and regulations on Page 21-27.

Exhibitor Entry Statement (back of entry form) must be signed and returned to the Sebastian county fair office WITH the exhibitor Entry Form. If the statement is not signed or returned with the entry form the exhibitors entry will be returned.

Entries in this division open only to exhibitors who comply with the Rule No. 40. All animals must be unregistered crossbreeds and not subject to registered. Tattoos that can be traced to a breed association will result in animal being disqualified.

All animals must be unregistered crossbreeds and not subject to be registered. Tattoos that can be traced to a breed association will result in animal being disqualified.

All entries are subject to rules applicable to the JUNIOR DEPARTMENT GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS as set forth in the catalog.

Animals must be born prior to April 15, of the current year, and ALL animals must have a full mouth of baby teeth at time of show - NO adult teeth present. OLDER animals will be mouthed. Classes will be broken the day of showing by weight ONLY. The classes will show accordingly. Classes will be set and broken by the superintendent.

Participation is limited to students only who are BONA FIDE members of a FFA or 4-H Club in good Standing Animals must be entered on official JUNIOR entry form.

THE COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT OR VOCATIONAL INSTRUCTOR MUST SIGN AND FORWARD TO THE SEBASTIAN COUNTY FAIR BY JULY 15TH IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE. ANY ANIMAL THAT IS SHOWN IN THE SEBASTIAN COUNTY FAIR AND HAS NOT HAD THEIR HEALTH PAPERS CHECKED BY ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY PERSONNEL UPON ARRIVAL AT THE FAIRGROUNDS WILL BE DISQUALIFIED FROM COMPETITION, AND NO PREMIUMS OR PRIZES WILL BE AWARDED.

#### JUNIOR LIVESTOCK AUCTION

Superintendent: Bessie Wood Vo-Ag Instructors and 4-H Leaders

- 1. Only active 4-H or FFA members of a Sebastian County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter and attend a Sebastian County School District may sell animals in the Junior Livestock Auction.
- 2. Only animals that have been shown during the Sebastian County Fair may be sold in the auction. And only sold once.
- 3. Exhibitors must be present at the time of sale.
- 4. Animals that are eligible to be sold in the Junior Livestock Auction include market steers, market swine, market lambs, pullet chain project chickens, market rabbits, and market goats.
- **5.** Only one lot per exhibitor can be sold from any of the following categories in the Junior Livestock Auction: market steers, market swine, market lambs, pullet chain project chickens (a pen of pullet chain chickens will be 3), market rabbits and market goats.
- 6. Exibitors must fill out a thank you card to buyer at the conclusion of the auction. Thank you cards will be provided in the livestock office.
- 7. The Junior Livestock Sale will be limited to 15 market steers, 15 market lambs, 25 market swine, 18 pens of pullet chain project chickens, 2 rabbit meat pens, 2 rabbit single fryers and 5 market goats. For every 5 exhibitors over the limit, an additional 1 market animal will be added to the division.
- 8. Animals being sold will be ranked by the judge and must meet the following minimum and maximum weights: steers 1000 lbs., lambs 40 lbs., swine 150-280 lbs. Goats 25 lbs. Pullet chain pens, rabbits will also be ranked by the judge and must merit a blue or red ribbon.
- 9. All junior exhibitors will be placed on the pre-auction Premium list. Animals not selected for the Junior Livestock Auction will not be brought into the arena during the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 10.Light weight animals that do not meet minimum weight requirements are eligible to show for premium points only, and will not show in championship drive or be eligible to sell in Junior Auction.
- 11. An exhibitor may choose to sell for premium only and retain ownership. This will not qualify another animal to sell in their slot.
- 12. Exhibitors, who qualify for the Junior Livestock Auction with more than one animal must report to the Livestock Office with their choice of animal to be sold within 30 minutes of the conclusion of the steer show. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of their auction slot.
- 13. W-9 Forms will be provided to all Auction participants who receive \$500 or more.

- 14.Exhibitors who exhibit the Grand or Reserve Grand market animal and also qualify anot her exhibit for the Junior Livestock Auction may choose to sell the second exhibit in the order where the judge places that animal. He or she will only be able to sell one animal in the sale.
- 15. All market animals must be registered by July 15 of the current year.
- 16. The following people will be charged with verifying registration of market animals: Extension Agents, Agriculture Instructors, Junior Livestock Committee Members and 4-H Leaders with a committee member or Extension Agent. Each exhibitor may register as many market animals as they want (steer, lamb, hog, goat, rabbit). They may only bring and show 2 animals per species in the market classes.
- 17. The ownership deadline for market steers, market lambs, market hogs, and market goats is July 15 of current year.
- 18. All market animals must have an assigned identification to be able to go through the Junior Livestock Auction. All market animals must have an ID # in their ear to be able to show. This may be their own ID #.

    - Substitutions will be allowed at check in, and <u>only</u> if in the same breed, class, and judging group as originally registered.
- 5. A MANDATORY EXHIBITOR MEETING WILL BE HELD AT 4:30 PM Wednesday OF THE FAIR. ALL EXHIBITORS OR A REPRESENTATIVE MUST BE PRESENT IN ORDER FOR THEIR ENTRIES TO BE JUDGED.
- 6. Judging will begin promptly at 5 p.m. on Wednesday of the fair, beginning with the junior show followed by the open show.
  - Exhibitors will place rabbits on a judging table with the other members of their class.
  - All breeds will be recognized and judged in accordance with the breed standards specified

# **DIVISION 4: MEAT CLASS**

Meat class competition identifies an exhibitor's ability to raise and select a consistent quality animal for meat production. The exhibitor must be able to prove he/she raised and selected the stock he/she is showing.

Meat class will be judged as specified in the ARBA Standard of Perfection and is limited to junior exhibitors. All Meat Class rabbits must be weighed by the Judge or in the Judge's presence at the time of judging.

- 1. A meat pen is one pen consisting of three rabbits of the same breed and variety, under 10 weeks of age; minimum 3 1/2 pounds, not over 5 1/2 pounds each.
- 2. A Single Fryer is one rabbit, under 10 weeks of age; minimum 3 1/2 pounds, not over 5 1/2 pounds.

#### **Rules:**

All Ag. Mechanics projects are subject to 2023 rules of the Sebastian County Fair. All exhibitors must agree to the rules.

Exhibitors must be an Arkansas resident and enrolled in a Sebastian County school or be a Sebastian County resident and must be a Sebastian County FFA or 4H member.

A project can be exhibited one time in the Sebastian County fair.

The project must have been constructed during the current school year associated with the event. Each project must have a build list and pictures of the construction of the project in a portfolio.

The Ag. Mechanics Director must approve any signs or banners before being displayed on any of the projects.

All exhibitors must compete in a group class or individual. A group may be made up of 2-8 students.

This may include bits, spurs, tack, gates, chutes, stands, feeders, deer stands, hog traps, cleaning racks, etc.

#### 4. Home Convenience

This division may include indoor/outdoor furniture, tables, bar stools, bookshelves, swings, benches, show boxes, animal feeders, fire pits, firewood racks, grills, etc.








#### **ADULT & YOUTH DIVISIONS**

- 1. All exhibits must be made or canned in the last year by the person or persons making the exhibit. In those cases where an exhibit has been made by more than one or a group of persons, then the group must decide on one person's name under which to enter the exhibit. A check for any premium money earned would be issued to that person representing the group. Any exhibitor residing out of Sebastian County will exhibit for show only. **No premiums will be paid to out of county exhibitors.**
- 2. ENTRIES MAY ONLY BE MADE THE SATURDAY BEFORE THE FAIR BETWEEN 10:00 AM AND 2:00 PM OR MONDAY OF THE FAIR BETWEEN 1:00 PM and 7:00 PM. FOOD PRESERVATION ENTRIES SHOULD BE MADE ON MONDAY. Cut flowers entered on Monday in the Floral Design and Floriculture departments may be replaced with fresher blossoms between 8 a.m. and 9 a.m. on Tuesday of the fair.
- 3. Exhibits can be made in the name of the maker only. Whenever the superintendent receives the information or has doubt that the exhibit is made by the exhibitor, an affidavit will be required to remove the question of doubt. If it is ascertained that any exhibitor has made a false statement or entry in regard to any article exhibited, all premiums awarded shall be forfeited.
- 4. Soiled articles will not be accepted. All imported articles are strictly prohibited.
- 5. Each entry must have been completed during the past year. No exhibit shall be entered in the Sebastian County Fair a second time.
- 6. EXHIBITORS ARE LIMITED TO ONLY ONE ENTRY IN A CLASS.
- 7. All persons exhibiting must be at the grounds personally, or have a representative check their exhibits in & check them out. Exhibits must be placed by 7p.m. Monday of the fair, & must remain on exhibit until 1p.m. Monday following the fair.
- 8. IF AN EXHIBITOR REMOVES HIS/HER EXHIBIT BEFORE 1:00 P.M. MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR, ALL PREMIUMS AWARDED SHALL BE FORFEITED.
- 9. EXHIBITS MAY BE REMOVED AT 3:00 P.M. the Monday following the fair. <u>ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE RE-MOVED BY 7:00 P.M. MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR, AT WHICH TIME THE BUILDING WILL BE LOCKED. THE FAIR WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR EXHIBITS NOT CLAIMED BY 7:00 P.M MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR.</u>
- 10. At the beginning of each department is a proposed criteria for judging items in that department. This criteria will be used as a guideline to award a blue, red, or white ribbon to each item.
- 11. Worthy exhibits will be rated A, B, or C. Premiums will be paid on the point basis, at the rate of 25 cents per point. Judging of Creative Arts exhibits will be Tuesday of the fair at 10 a.m.
- 12. All exhibits are judged on their own merit. They are not judged in competition with other entries in the class.
- 13. Every exhibit will be under the control of the superintendent, and every possible care will be taken to prevent damage; but in no case will the Fair be responsible for damage or loss that may occur.
- 14. Entries will be accepted only for the classes listed in each department.
- 15. Canned products may be shown in standard jars only, not larger than quarts. Jelly may be shown in standard jelly glasses which have been sealed. Paraffin is not allowed.

- 16. Division Requirements: Adult department is open to anyone ages 20 and over or married individuals under 20, Youth department is open to unmarried youth ages 5 through 19, Clothesline Art is open to anyone ages 2 and up (See Department 21 for more details.
- 17. Items should have no visible identifying marks. Identifying marks should be removed or completely covered. If any identifying marks are visible at the time of judging it will result in an automatic 3rd place.
- 18. Superintendents have the right to refuse any item that is inappropriate or not in the best interest of the fair.

EVERY EXHIBITOR MUST COME TO THE GENERAL REGISTRATION TABLE, LOCATED IN THE CREATIVE ARTS BUILDING, TO REGISTER AND TO GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER. IF YOU DO NOT GET AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER YOUR ENTRY WILL BE INELIGIBLE FOR JUDGING. THE FAIR ASSOCIATION WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR EXHIBITS NOT PICKED UP BY MONDAY FOLLOWING THE FAIR BY 7:00 PM. UNCLAIMED EXHIBITS WILL REMAIN IN THE CREATIVE ARTS BUILDING AND WILL BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE FAIR ASSOCIATION AND DISPOSED OF AS SEEN FIT BY FAIR OFFICIALS. FAILURE TO PICK UP EXHIBIT ITEMS WILL RE-

#### **Preservation Rules**

- 1. All entries must have been preserved within the previous twelve months and can only be entered once.
- 2. NOTE: Exhibits must be labeled with the date of food preservation and method of preservation. Method must state whether canned in water, pressure canned, or other, process time and the pounds of pressure where appropriate. Entries without required labeling will not be judged This will save time with getting items checked in.
- 3. Judging will be done by comparison to recognized standards of quality and safety.
- 4. For judging and safety reasons, jars must be clear glass with Mason type labeled on jar or box with clean metal lid and ring, vacuum sealed and of acceptable size per recipe. Typically quart, pint, or smaller
- 5. Due to safety reasons no canned squash including summer, zucchini or spaghetti, pureed or mashed pumpkin, sweet potatoes, or potatoes will be judged. Pickled summer squash and zucchini are allowed.
- 6. If recipe used is not from either: So Easy to Preserve, 4th, 5th, and 6th Editions, University of Georgia Cooperative Extension Service USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning, 2009 revision. USDA and National Institute of Food and Agriculture.

  Then entry should be also accompanied by recipe from other Extension
  - publications upbdated or published after 1995
- 7. Headspace is the unfilled space above the food in a jar and below the lid. Recommedations for headspace are:
  - 1/4 inch for jams, jellies, juices, and fruit purees
  - 1/2 inch for fruits, pickles, and tomatoes processed in a water-bath canner
  - 1 to 1 1/4 inches for vegetables, meats, or other products processed in a pressure canner.
- 8. Food should be packed into the jar in such a way that heat can easily penetrate throughout the jar's contents. This means there must be proper balance of solids and liquids. Tightly packed solids make it difficult for heat to penetrate throughout the mass.
- 9. There should be enough liquid present so that liquid covers the product and prevents the jar from being solid, yet there should not be excess liquid.

Preservation Rules Continued:

**10.** Although sealing jelly with paraffin was once a standard practice, this is no longer recommended, and will NOT be allowed to enter in the fair.

#### 11. Containers:

CANNED VEGETARIES

Products should be in a Mason-type, standard size (1/2 pint, pint, or quart), clear canning jar. Regular or wide-mouth styles may be used, but containers must have a threaded top with a self-sealing, two-piece metal lid.

Commercial jars, like the ones used for mayonnaise, peanut butter, jelly, etc are not recommended for home canning. Since they are much more likely to break during processing and are less likely to seal properly, they are NOT allowed for competition in fairs. If jars of this type are entered, they will not be judged.

Also, if jars were purchased in the canning section of a store but do not specify that they are Mason-type jars either on the jar itself or on the box, they are not allowed for competition. They may be safe for home canning, but no current USDA recommendations exist for their use. Colored jars are also excluded.

Two-piece lids consist of a flat metal lid held in place by a metal band. Lids must be brand new. Bands should be clean and free of rust. They should not be bent or misshapen. The old style bail-type closures and porcelain-lined zinc caps are not acceptable. Plastic lids may be safe for home canning, but are NOT allowed for competition, as it is impossible to detect a correct seal.

Jars should be clean and free of mineral deposits. The jars will be tested to see that the jar has a seal. This is usually done by pressing the middle of the lid with a finger. If the lid springs up when the fin ger is removed, the lid is not sealed. An \alternative test would be to hold the jar at eye level and look across the lid. A sealed lid should appear curved down in the center, not flat or bulging.



Three dimensional work or padded is not permitted. Design cannot be made on point, keep block square. Do not quilt your entry. Theme is Tropical.

Eligibility: Open to all ages and skill levels. Participants may enter more than one block.

To Enter: Please bring your entries to check in or take to the Mama's Log House by August 15th. If these locations don't work for you contact Betty at the email below to arrange for a place to drop off. Please pin a piece of paper to the back of your block with your name, address and phone. All remaining blocks will be made into another quilt, wall hanging, etc. also to be raffled. Proceeds from the raffled quilt will go to improving the fairgrounds.

- 6. There are electrical outlets available.
- 7. Booths will be rated A. B. or C. Premiums will be paid as follows:
  - A. \$25.00 B. \$15.00 C. \$10.00
- 8. One youth club exhibit and one adult club exhibit will receive a Grand Champion or special Rosette Ribbon for being judged the best overall exhibit in that category.

This year's hay show will be held in combination with the Sebastian County Fair. The Hay show is open to all Sebastian County hay producers at a minimal cost of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per sample. The Purpose of the hay show is to encourage producers to test his/her hay to determine the nutritional content of the product they produce. All Sebastian County producers are encouraged to participate.

#### **Rules and Regulations**

- 1. Each class entry shall contain a representative sample of hay produced in Sebastian County by the contestant.
- 2. Hay samples are due no later than 4:30 p.m. August 10th, at the Sebastian County Extension Service 7600 Taylor Ave. Barling, Arkansas.
- 3. Samples can be submitted by contacting the Extension Office at 479-484-7737or by delivering a core sample and visual sample of your hay to the Extension Office by the entry deadline.
- 4. Only core samples taken with an approved forage/hay probe will be accepted for chemical analysis in the Sebastian County Hay Show. Hay Probes are available to be checked out at the extension office if the producer does not have access to one. Producers are <a href="mailto:encouraged">encouraged</a> to contact the extension agent to visit their farm or field and collect samples for hay show entry.
- 5. Current Year Sebastian County Hay samples should include: 1) approximately one-half pound core sample hay <u>and</u> 2) a 1 gallon freezer bag full of loose hay to be used as a visual representation of analyzed hay.
- 6. No grab or loose samples will be accepted for analysis in the Sebastian County Hay show. Grab or loose samples will only be utilized as a visual sample to be viewed at hay show.
- 7. Entries will be displayed at the Sebastian County Fair; samples will be displayed using an assigned number to be provided by hay show coordinator. No names or other identification will be displayed on the representative sample. Hay show samples will be separate from hay samples entered in the agronomy division (which receive no analysis and are only awarded premium points).
- 8. An educational meeting will immediately follow the meal.
- 9. Samples will be ranked using visual examination (Totaling 50 points) and laboratory analysis using the Relative Feed Value score (Totaling 50 points)
- 10. Entry Fee is the cost of each sample.
- 11. Awards will be given as follows: Sebastian County Best of Show, Bermudagrass Common Division Winner, Bermudagrass Hybrid Division winner, Mixed Grass Division winner, and Other Division winner. Awards will also be given to producers with the highest % CP and highest % TDN.
- 12. All exhibits will be destroyed at the conclusion of the Sebastian County Fair.
